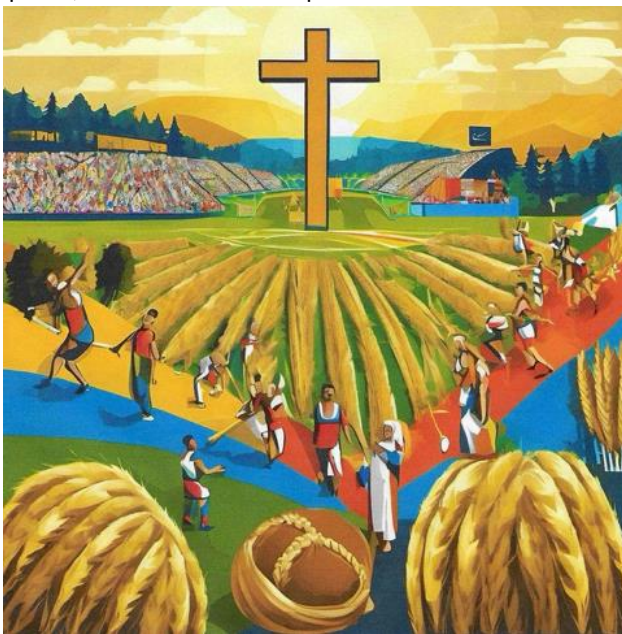

Pastor's Corner:

At the time of writing, the Olympic Games in Paris are in full swing. So far, Canada has won medals in 18 disciplines, and Denmark has captured 2.



Millions of people worldwide are following the games, either because they have purchased tickets to the many stadiums or are comfortably seated in front of the big screens or their own TVs. As many of you probably know, the first recorded Olympic Games were held in 776 BC. The ancient Olympic Games were a religious festival held in honour of the god Zeus. Back then, just as today, the games were a major cultural event that attracted participants from all over present-day Greece.

During the Olympic Games, what was called "The Olympic Truce" prevailed, which meant that participants were 'protected' from war during their journey to and from the games and while the games were in progress.

But such idolatry was not tolerated by the growing Christian community. After holding about 293 games over nearly 1200 years, the East Roman Emperor Theodosius I banned the games in 393 AD to put an end to these pagan customs. Effectively, he put the Olympic celebrations to rest for about 1500 years until the French baron, Pierre de Coubertin, revived the Olympic Games in Athens in 1896.

Today, the modern Olympic Games have evolved into a global event that not only celebrates athletic prowess but

also aims toward international peace and cooperation. Athletes from all over the world gather to compete and showcase their dedication, discipline, and determination. Qualities or virtues, if you will, that Christianity also highlights; they are just called: endurance, humility, and fellowship.

The Apostle Paul often used athletic metaphors in his letters to convey spiritual truths. For example, in 1 Corinthians 9:24-27, Paul compares the Christian life to a race and encourages believers to run so as to obtain an eternal prize. This metaphor emphasizes the importance of discipline, self-control, and striving for excellence—all values found in the ethos of the Olympic Games.

This column will be my contribution to this year's harvest edition of our church newsletter, so what does all this have to do with the harvest?

Harvest is an important concept in Christianity as it symbolizes both physical and spiritual abundance. Harvest time is a time of joy and gratitude because the harvest reflects God's provision and blessings. In Matthew 9:37-38, Jesus uses the imagery of the harvest when he says: "The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field." With these words, Jesus emphasizes the necessary readiness to spread the gospel—the same necessary readiness we find in all athletes preparing for the Olympics.

The preparation and dedication required for the Olympic Games, I think, can be compared to the toil and effort involved in cultivating a successful harvest. Just as farmers invest time and energy into their crops, athletes invest years of their lives in training and endurance to compete at the highest level. The culmination of both efforts is a time of celebration—athletes rejoice in their achievements, while farmers rejoice in the fruits of their labour.

The Olympic Games and the Christian concept of the harvest both celebrate human effort, dedication, and the joy of reaping rewards. So with Christianity's lens on, we can see and appreciate the spiritual significance of the global event that the Olympic Games are. The virtues of endurance, discipline, and gratitude, and the desire for peace among nations are universal and bridge the gap between ancient traditions and modern aspirations.

These are the shared values that unite us despite everything else that separates us (where else in the world is it possible for a Canadian or Dane to have breakfast in peace and harmony with a North Korean?) And let us not forget the spirit of the harvest. Whether it manifests

itself at the Olympic Games, after the harvest of crops in fields and gardens, or in the experience of Christianity growing within oneself or in the world, this spirit enriches our lives with a crown of joy and gratitude that rewards long and hard toil.

May we look forward to a long, warm, and bountiful autumn.

Our warm, dry summer is soon coming to an end and many of the usual activities at our Church are gearing up again. Over the summer DSUK approved our adding "Sharon" to our Church's name and also approved the changes to our constitution that were passed at our AGM. However, they have asked for us to make some other changes so our Council will be looking at these. The donations to 3 local charities that were approved at the AGM have also been completed and gratefully received.

Our kitchen renovations and lift committees have continued to meet with the architect and contractors. Electrical upgrades have been completed at both the Church and for our old parsonage (214). Our architect is now working on drawings to submit to the City to get permits for these projects. About 10-11 general contractors have been contacted about taking on these projects and their number has been narrowed down to 4 possibilities. We have asked these 4 general contractors to submit their tenders to us by the end of September.

The annual spring clean up on May 25 saw many jobs, large and small taken care of, both inside and out. And now flowers are blooming profusely around the Church despite the watering restrictions and dry weather.

Work on the 2 new stained glass windows, that are being donated to our Church, is well underway and hopefully they will be installed this fall.

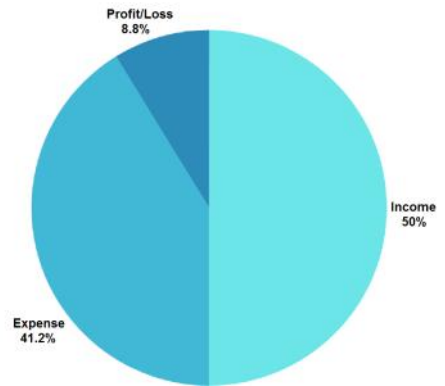
Financial Report

Did you know that you can avoid capital gains taxes by transferring securities directly to our Church? When you transfer securities rather than selling them, you don't pay taxes on any gains and you get a charitable receipt on the fair market value of the securities. Sam Nickerson is a 24 year-old, blind university student living in Calgary. Sam continues to prove he is more than just that! He enjoys performing music, listening to audiobooks, and physical activity like climbing and hiking. As a volunteer Ambassador with the CNIB, Sam advocates for himself and others by speaking in the community about the unique needs of those who are blind or partially sighted. He does this by raising awareness of resources and programs designed to help Albertans impacted by sight loss so they can live the lives they choose.

It is always exciting to watch a movie together with other people and afterwards hear if others saw or felt the same as you did, or if they've gotten different aspects out of the same movie. **Our movie lunches take place every 1st Thursday of the month. Study Group

This Fall, I aim to finish the study of N. F. S. Grundtvig, his time, life, works and the impact he has had on Danish culture and identity. Danish Class

On **Saturday, October 12th at 10:00 am** a Danish class for newcomers/beginners starts in the basement hall of our Church. The class costs \$50 for the fall. (There will be additional expenses for lesson books because the

books will be imported from Denmark.) Deadline for enrolment in the class is **October 1st**. **You can enroll by emailing pastor@danishlutheranchurch.ca.** After October 1st, I will order the needed number of books. The book, **Aktivt Dansk**, is a basic book of Danish language and grammar and the price will be about \$120 + shipping.

Sing-along

The community around singing is an important part of Danish culture. Danes are very proud of their unique collection of songs, which grows year by year as new songwriters and hymn writers publish their texts. We sing in joy and in sorrow; at parties, during sports events, in everyday life, in schools, and in churches.

Here in Calgary, we have been fortunate for many years to have Ketty, who has faithfully brought her accordion and both led the choir and accompanied us during our sing-along evenings/afternoons. Now Ketty has found full-time work and can no longer play for us in the afternoons.

In the spring, we tried moving the singalongs back to the evenings without great success. Because singing is such an important part of Danish culture, we are now trying to move the sing-along to the **3rd Sunday of the month from 12:00 pm - 1:30 pm beginning on October 20th**. Remember to bring your lunch bag to the coffee time after the service!

Hospital Visits

Pastor Charlotte has been told that since the Covid pandemic in 2020, people are no longer asked what denomination they belong to when they are being hospitalized. Nor are they asked if they want spiritual care from a trained volunteer, one of the pastors at the hospital, or their own pastor. That means that if you are hospitalized, or know of someone that is hospitalized, you have to give Pastor Charlotte a call if you want her to visit that person.

Church Musician Change

Sunday, **September 1** will be the last Sunday, until the end of April 2025, that Christopher Nielsen, our talented pianist, will be playing for a Sunday service. Christopher has been invited to do a fellowship at Stanford University in California. This will run from September through April of the academic year. He and Adelina plan to come back to Calgary when his fellowship has been completed.

In the meantime, Mattias Basboll will be filling in for Christopher -- and he has some big shoes to fill. Mattias is a

talented pianist as well, but playing for Church services will be a new experience for him. Please be patient with him as he adjusts to playing for our worship services and please encourage him as he "learns the ropes".

The Kitchen Renovation Project

One of the two major projects at the Church, for which planning has been underway for more than a year, is getting a commercial kitchen installed that meets the City of Calgary's health codes. (The other major project, the installation of a vertical lift, was addressed in our previous newsletter.) Currently it is OK with the City for us to use our kitchen to serve coffee and tea with snacks, and to have potluck meals. However, we are not allowed to prepare a meal for a group any larger than the average Canadian family size (which would be about 4 people).

Also, since the disastrous hospitalization of over 20 children, after having been served food prepared in an unlicensed kitchen, it became obvious that we need to bring our old kitchen up to current standards. A committee was struck to look into the requirements, and to research different options for everything from flooring to appliances and dishes. Many commercial kitchens in other churches have been visited, several suppliers of kitchen appliances have been visited too, and options for countertops and cupboards have been investigated as well.

Our electrical system needed to be upgraded and that has been completed. Our plumbing had to be assessed, and materials were also tested to check for hazards such as asbestos. Our architect has been busy drawing up plans for the kitchen and there have been several revisions to these plans. Right now we are in the process of selecting a general contractor to do the work and also applying for development permits from the City.

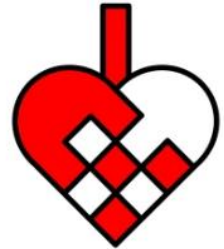

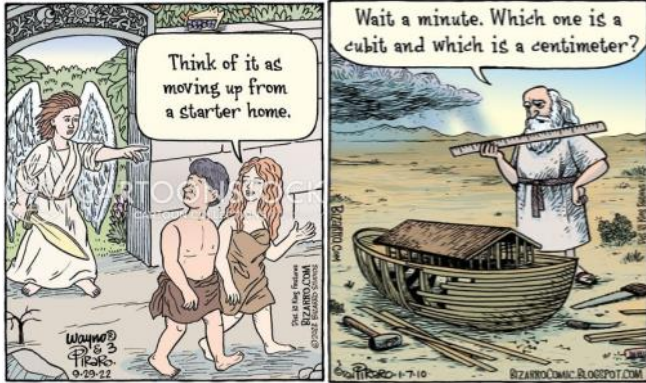
Outreach Program

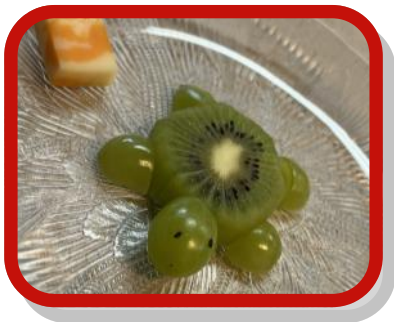
